

to present evidence of literacy (ability to read and write English) in
order to vote at the coming election.
This may be done by one of the
following methods:

rum may be done by one or the following methods:

1. By presenting a certificate or diploma showing that he has completed the work of an approved atheth grade alementary school or of a higher school in which English is the language of instruction. This certificate may be presented to the registering and the new voter will he credited on the register that proof of literacy has been presented. Or the eighth grade certificate er diploma may be presented to the the election inspectors at the polls on election day. on election day.

2. All news voters who are not able to qualify by the method mentioned above must obtain a certificate of literacy.

Certificates of literacy may be is-

sued as follows:

To all persons who have suc cessfully completed the work pres-cribed for the sixth grade of the public schools or the equivalent chewhere.

b. To all persons who have not completed the work of the sixth grade, after successfully passing the literary test furnished by the state education department.

a. All men and women born in the United States who become qualified to vote in New York State after January 1, 1922.
b. All men and women of foreign birth who became qualified to vote in New York State after January 1, 1922.




