Dr. McCarty Injured

Dr. F. E. McCarty, Wellsville physician, had a narrow escape from death or serious injuries Sunday night when his automobile left the road and turned over several times near Stanards.

According to reports, Dr. McCarty was traveling towards Stanards about 10 o'clock Sunday night when a front tire on his machine blew out, pulling the automobile off the road.

Painful cuts about the face and bruises on the shoulders and chest were sustained by the victim, who was alone in the car. He was taken to the Jones Memorial hospital where he was attended by Dr. George Roos and later went to his home.

The genial doctor submitted Monday to x-rays at the hospital to determine the full extent of his injuries. The car was badly wrecked.

Rob Feed Store

A puzzling robbery Monday confronted Allegany county authorities in Wellsville. The object of their search is a bandit or bandits who were clever enough to solve the combination of a safe in a feed store here, remove \$32 in cash, lock up the safe again and make a getaway.

The robbery occurred at the G. L. F. Service Company store in the rear of the Red & White store, 83 West Pearl street and was discovered Monday morning when Guy W. Rowley, manager of the service here, opened for business.

The yeggs did not get into the Red & White grocery in the front part of the building, which is separated from the feed store by a heavy door.

The theft occurred either late Saturday night or some time Sunday, according to Manager Rowley, since the place was in order when he closed Saturday. It would have escaped unnoticed had it not been discovered that a back door had been jimmied.

Baldwin House Burned

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed a two story house at 43 O'Connor street, owned by William Baldwin at 5 o'clock Monday morning. The house had been vacated only last week by Claude Austin. A barn in which three horses, four cows and seven hogs were kept was saved from burning by the volunteer fire department.

The fire had such a start when firemen arrived that it was impossible to save the dwelling. The roof of the house caved in soon after Fire Chief George Hallock arrived. Efforts of the firemen were directed to prevent the spread of the flames to the barn and nearby buildings. A large straw stack near the barn was also saved.

A part of the belongings of the Austin family were still in the house and garage. Most of their property had been removed from the premises.

Mr. Baldwin stated that his sons went to the house Sunday evening to get water but believed that there were no fires left in the house. Water from a well at the house was used by the Baldwins, as the well at their house was dry. Mr. Baldwin lives two doors away from the house that was destroyed. The loss is partially covered by insurance Mr. Baldwin stated.

Friendship

The most destructive fire that has visited the town of Friendship for a long time swept the stand of buildings on the Charles F. Guilford dairy farm last Monday evening. The farm is situated on the White Creek improved road about three miles north of the village of Friendship. The large gambrel roof cow barn, machine barn, dairy house, new silo, straw barn, together with the winter supply of hay and ensilage and much valuable machinery and tools were totally destroyed. Of the live stock in the barn, all were successfully removed except one small calf. The fire started about 6 o'clock. Mr. Guilford and his daughter, Mina, were doing chores in the barn. Mr. Guilford, carrying a lighted lantern, is supposed to have gone to the hay loft to throw down some feed. He was alone at the time and is not able to recall exactly what happened but apparently he fell thru a scaffold some 15 feet above the floor. Miss Mina was in the basement and heard the thud of his fall and rushed to his aid. She found him in a dazed condition and the hay ablaze from the smashed lantern. After dragging her father to safety, she turned her attention to rescuing the cattle confined in the barn. With the aid of the farm dog she was able to drive out the 25 cows and three calves. One calf perished. She was also able to remove a Pontiac car and a truck loaded with feed.
