Public Health of Steuben County
The Public Health Nursing Committee of Steuben County are arranging centers in their various communities where the county nurses may be interviewed on certain days.
The towns of Canisteo, Greenwood, Hartsville and West Union will be visited on the second week of each month. The county nurse, Mrs. Standish, holding office hours on the Monday of that week from 2 to 3 p. m., in the office of Dale Baker. The type of work under the Public Health Committee done by the county nurse is home visitation for communicable disease, pre-natal, post-natal, tuberculosis, pre-school and school follow-up with many other types of service.
It is also planned by the nurse to hold monthly group conferences, enabling the mothers with children to come in for weighing and measuring.
The next office hours will be Monday, Dec. 14th. If there are requests for service in the locality during that week, please notify Mrs. Wm. Kellogg.
