Maurice Goodrich Wounded

Maurice Goodrich, Wellsville, is carrying a couple of shotgun slugs in his scalp and is mighty lucky he has a scalp left to carry them in. Goodrich was out hunting on Beach Hill Sunday afternoon with Clarence Briggs, also of Wellsville. Briggs was walking behind Goodrich thru the woods.

Suddenly, and for some unexplained reason, the shotgun which Briggs was carrying was discharged. It was pointed in the general direction of his companion and stray slugs lodged in the latter's scalp.

Goodrich went to the office of Drs. F. E. and E. F. Comstock where it was revealed by an x-ray examination that at least two of the slugs were imbedded in the scalp. It was expected the shot would be probed for and removed the next day.

Seek Killer of Deer

Ward Whitney, Wellsville game protector began an investigation Monday which he hopes will end in the apprehension of a vandal or vandals who shot and killed a young buck at Riverside some time Saturday.

Ed. Bentley, Jr., Riverside, stumbled on the carcass of the deer Sunday morning while out setting his traps in the back of the pine grove between the main highway and the Erie railroad near the J. B. Murray farm. A shotgun charge which had struck the little fellow broadside killed the buck.

The find was reported to Warden Whitney who at once began an investigation. Mr. Whitney said the animal killed Saturday was less than a year old and weighed only about 60 pounds.

Daily average production of crude oil in United States in week ended Nov. 14th, totaled 2,462,130 barrels, an increase of 5,266 barrels over the preceding week, according to the Oil and Gas Journal. In the corresponding week of 1930 production averaged 2,305,924 barrels daily.

A man and his wife were brief visitors in Bolivar on Monday while enroute for their home in Warren, O., from Raquette Lake, N. Y., where he killed a deer that dressed 205 pounds. A number of local hunters had a good look at the deer while the car was parked here.

George H. Parker, a veteran of the Civil War, retired business man and former postmaster in Bolivar, died at his home, corner Main and South streets this village, Monday afternoon, Nov. 16th, at 1:30 o'clock. Mr. Parker suffered a fractured hip 16 weeks ago yesterday as the result of a fall out of a chair at his home here. He never fully recovered from the injury.

The car, a Marquette coach, had been parked in the Lain driveway, east side of South Main street. It was in gear and, evidently the brakes failed to hold, for it began backing down the incline. The running board and fender were damaged.
