Steinheim Second Oldest Museum in United States

Alfred N. Y., Nov. 24.—Correspondence with Laurence V. Coleman, director of the American Association of Museums, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C., shows that the Allen Steinheim Museum building on the Alfred University campus is the second oldest museum building on a college campus in the United States.

In a recent letter Coleman states that the oldest college museum building is on the Harvard campus, while the old Peabody Museum at Yale, now demolished to make way for a new building, was the second. The demolishing of Peabody Museum moved Allen Steinheim Museum up to second place in point of age. Steinheim was completed in 1879. A stone over the entrance is carved "76", but a portion of the building was added after that date but not after 1879.
