Child Electrocuted

Believed to have grasped an electric wire which had insufficient insulation, Margaret Ann, ten-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Schwab, Hamilton street, was killed instantly about 4 p. m. Monday afternoon.

According to reports, the child, together with two older ones, were playing in the front part of the house, while Mrs. Schwab was working in the kitchen, when one of the children rushed out telling her mother that something happened to baby sister. The mother hurried back to find the child dead. Physicians were called and Coroner H. E. Cooley, Wellsville, notified. It is believed that the child took hold of an electric wire leading from a 120 volt plug to a floor lamp and that the shock aggravated by dampness on the floor, caused death.

Coroner Cooley will continue his investigation. Mr. Schwab is well known here, being identified with Wellsville Boy Scout troops. He is employed by the Sinclair refinery. Two other children survive.

To Play Canisteo

With two victories hung up on the baskets in Wellsville gym as the result of a double-header with Andover and Whitesville to start the season, the Orange and Black today began preparations for one of the toughest early season games on the schedule—a contest with Canisteo High School here next Friday evening.
