Forty Years Ago

Aged Veteran Dies

The ranks of the Civil War veterans in Allegany county were reduced by one Monday, following the death of James P. Newell, 90, Bolivar's oldest resident, and former president of the village, which occurred yesterday in the home of his son, G. D. Newell, Bolivar. Deceased had been a resident of Bolivar for 50 years. He was born in Bellefonte, Pa., Feb. 23, 1841. He is survived by two sons, G. D. Newell, Bolivar, and G. S. Newell, San Louis, Obispo, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. A. B. Marchis, Olean.

Altho Mr. Newell had been in failing health for some time, his memory remained excellent. One of the highlights of his career in the Civil War was an invitation received from President Lincoln to dine at the White House.

Funeral services were held at the home of his son at 2 p. m., Wednesday. Rev. Mr. Grove, pastor of St. Stephens Episcopal church, Olean officiating with interment in Bolivar.
