Hosts to County Schoolmen

For the first time this year, male members of the Wellsville High School faculty will be hosts to the Allegany County Schoolmasters Association here Wednesday evening, when Dean J. Nelson Norwood, Alfred University's well known economist and student of sociology, will address the group.

Dean Norwood will discuss unemployment cycles, reasons for their periodic appearance, and remedies suggested and applied by the world's leading students of economics. The meeting will be held in the high school at 7 p. m., and will open with a luncheon served by members of the home-making class of the high school, under the direction of Miss Lita French. Superintendents, both city and district; principals and male teachers in Allegany county schools will attend.

Invitations have been issued to football and basketball officials who have worked in the county to attend the gathering.

Officers of the County Schoolmasters Association are as follows: President, Prin. J. F. Whitford, Bolivar; vice president, District Superintendent W. G. Pope, Andover; treasurer, Prin. Robert B. Hardy, Andover; secretary, Prin. Clarence V. Cripps, Richburg. The association numbers nearly 50 schoolmen, and meets quarterly.

To Inspect Schools
