U. S. MAKES DRIVE ON COUNTERFEITERS

Secret Service Men Round Up 138 Suspects.

Washington.—Secret service, aided by local police, made 138 arrests in the country last month for counterfeiting.

This is a record for one month and evidence of the vigor with which the campaign against counterfeiting is being conducted.

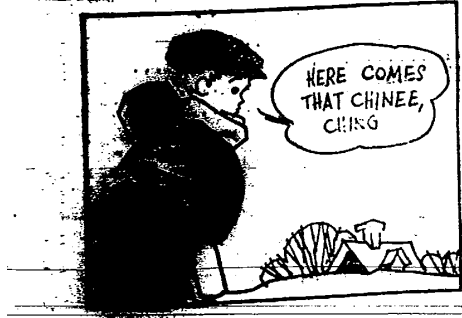

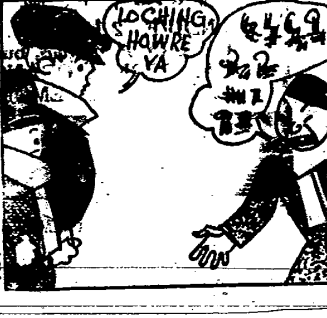
