Dog Owners' Notice

Dog licenses for 1931 expired on December 31, 1931. The 1932 license fee is due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January 1 to December 31, 1932. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction. An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed. Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept. License fees: Male dog, \$2.25; female dog, \$5.75; spayed female dog, \$2.25. These amounts include clerk's fees. No license can be issued for less than the full license fee. The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs. The enumerators of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerator's or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license. If you owned a dog last year and do not own one now, so advise the clerk of your town or city. Dog licenses in the town of Andover are issued by A. L. BLOSS, Clerk. P. O. Address, Andover, N. Y.

Turning Back the Pages Of Andover History

TAKEN FROM THE FILES OF THE ANDOVER NEWS

Forty Years Ago

William Starr, a trainman on the way freight, suffered compound fracture of his right leg, when the way freight piled up just after leaving the Andover station yesterday morning. The trouble was caused by the hind wheels of the locomotive jumping the frog at the juncture of the switch with the main track. Every car was thrown from the rails. Miss Minnie Hall has just closed a very successful term of school on Voorhes Hill. Anna, wife of Charles F. Potter of Independence, died Feb. 2, 1892. The funeral will be held at Green's Corners, at 2 p. m., Friday. The Postal Telegraph Company was moved Monday from H. E. Miner's store to Beebe, Williams & Co. store. Jason Beebe will hereafter be the operator. A party of young ladies took their best young men for a sleigh ride last Saturday night. The object point was Falcott Brown's of East Valley, which was reached in good season. They passed a very pleasant evening. Dr. W. W. Crandall left on Train 12, Monday night, for Albany, to attend the annual meeting of the State Medical Society. The doctor is the honored vice president of the society. Mr. and Mrs. J. A. O'Donnell of Hornellville drove to Andover Saturday evening and spent Sunday visiting Andover relatives and friends. The donation for Rev. G. W. Gibson last Wednesday evening netted over \$90. Not a bad "dose" to take—nor an undeserved one. George E. Brown is building a large ice house at the pond from which he intends to supply Andover people with ice during the summer. The signal tower four miles east of the village, on the Erie railroad, was opened for business Monday. C. H. Herrick and Frank Miner are the operators. On January 28, Levi D. Baker cut on the farm of Mrs. Bines probably the largest pine tree left standing in this part of the country. The lower cut, 12 feet long, made 997 feet of lumber, and the seven logs which the tree made netted a total of 4,889 feet. The logs were sawed at the G. E. Brown mill.

Married, at the Presbyterian parsonage, Wednesday evening, Jan. 22, by Rev. G. M. Jones, Mr. Jay Burdick and Miss Lochra Howland. Married, at St. Mary's Catholic church in Dansville, Tuesday, Jan. 14th, 1902, by Rev. M. Krischel, Mr. Fred Michael of Dansville and Miss Rose Joyce of Andover. The newly-married couple have passed several days with her parents in this village. They will make Dansville their future home. About 20 members of Dexter Post and Relief Corps of Wellsville were entertained last evening in the parlors of the M. E. church, by the local post and camp. The population of the Village of Andover as canvassed by J. C. Green and J. D. Cheesman is 997, which is a gain of ten from four years ago. Ira H., the son of Rev. Charles H. and Jennie L. Harrington, died at the Baptist parsonage, in this village Friday morning, Jan. 24th, aged 20 years and seven months. Ira came home from Rochester where he was attending school, not feeling well, to spend the holiday vacation with his parents. His illness developed into the disease which took him away. He was a member of the Freshman class of Rochester University. Funeral services were held at the Baptist manse last Sunday afternoon, under the direction of Rev. V. L. Eggleston, assisted by Rev. Pickett, Burdick, Jones and Rengel. Miss Mae Mosher, after four weeks' visit at her home in Deposit, returned Saturday night and will again answer the telephone calls at the central office.
