To Be Sold For Taxes

Thirty-five parcels of land in the village of Wellsville are listed for sale at public auction on Feb. 24th to satisfy village taxes for 1931. The amount of \$1,667.32 in back taxes is to be raised by the sale.

This will be the second year that Wellsville has conducted a sale to collect overdue village taxes. The plan made possible for the first time last year proved very successful. The amount to be collected this year is considerably smaller than last year. Last year 41 parcels of land were advertised and \$2,230.64 was due the village as arrears from 1927-1929, 1930.

Held For Robbery

After eluding police here Saturday afternoon by cleverly hiding his identity when picked off a Bolivar-Wellsville bus at the request of Bolivar authorities, Kenneth C. Harrington, 23, formerly of Bolivar and Wellsville, went to Hornell where he allegedly staged a bold robbery in a chain grocery store late Saturday night, only to be picked up by Hornell police a few moments later as he attempted to flee from an alleged speakeasy. He is held in the city jail at Hornell.

Harrington, wanted in Bolivar for passing a worthless check and in Wellsville for settlement of two bad checks which he cashed here in June 1930, will face a robbery charge in Hornell, police said.

Harrington, according to authorities, is the man who entered the A. & P. store at 109 Canisteo street, Hornell, late Saturday night and demanded of the manager, Arthur J. Townsend, who was preparing to close up the store, that he hand over all the money in the place. According to reports, the day's receipts had only a few moments earlier been transferred to a bank.
