Wants Prohibition Law

A petition bearing the names of over 200 Wellsville citizens was presented to the Village Board of Trustees of the village of Wellsville Monday night, asking the board to pass an ordinance to prohibit the sale and transportation of intoxicating liquor in that village under a \$100 fine or imprisonment for a misdemeanor.

Village Purchase Lot For Nurses' Home

The mayor and clerk of the village were authorized to enter into and execute a contract with the First Trust Company for the purchase of a lot in West Genesee street in a resolution adopted by the village board in its session Monday evening.

The purchase price of the lot which was purchased from the Standard Oil company over a year ago was \$5,500. To date \$2,000 has been paid leaving a balance of \$3,500 which is payable at the rate of \$1,000 a year with the privilege of paying the full amount due at any time.

The lot was purchased as a site for the erection of a nurses home for the hospital at some future date. The contract which was accepted was drawn by Village Attorney William Duke, Jr.

A letter of resignation from William Anderson as registrar of vital statistics was presented to the village board Monday evening. The letter was placed on file and will be acted on at the next meeting.

Car is Damaged

Alfred Hale, employee of the J. Dean Battery & Tire Service, escaped serious injury Saturday night when his car overturned in the ditch on the Wellsville-Stanards road. Hale was on his way home from work when the machine skidded and left the road just north of Stanards. The car was damaged but Hale's injuries consisted of a severe shaking up.

Teachers Donate

Teachers of the public schools have offered to contribute a total of \$4,250 from their salaries next year, to the Board of Education and the school budget will thus be reduced, Superintendent George F. Jammer announced Tuesday. All teachers here have received contract renewals for the coming school year. They are returnable April 4. Practically every one of the 54 members of the faculty including Superintendent Jammer and Principal Duane Anderson, donated a generous slice of their salaries in an effort to reduce the budget and at the same time give unimpaired service to Wellsville boys and girls in the schools.
