Seed Corn

It has been supposed that there was an over-supply of quality Corn o plant for this year's crop, and on that basis growers have based their advance prices.

In recent weeks the testing laboratory at Cornell has rejected 16,000 bushels of corn that had been saved for seed, because of excess moisture, and low germination, and it is now apparent that many thousands more bushels will have to go out of the seed and into the feed bins. This condition has not been explained but it is real and far-reaching.
