Dies in Elmira

Bertha Bennett of Elmira, former resident, died in St. Joseph's hospital, Elmira Sunday at 11 a. m. She was born in Hulls, Pa., on December 10, 1900 a daughter of Alvin Bennett and Lena Glover Bennett. She removed from Hulls to Wellsville where she lived for about ten years before going to Elmira.

Test Case Expected

Harry M. Guyon, 42, of 104 East State street, who said his home was in Genesee, Pa., is at liberty under \$50 bail awaiting a jury trial April 14th at 10 a. m., the result of his arrest late Monday afternoon by Sergeant Harold L. DeBrine on a charge of driving a car with improper registration.

He was apprehended in Main street and was arraigned before Police Justice P. L. O'Connor at the latter's home. He pleaded not guilty and demanded a jury trial. Guyon, a cattle buyer, is charged with violation of article three, section 12, paragraph one of the vehicle and traffic law. It is charged he operated a 1929 Ford coupe on the highway without displaying registration plates issued by the commissioner of motor vehicles of New York State. The car displayed a set of Pennsylvania registration plates while troopers charged that Guyon has been a resident of this state for two years.

Guyon, on the other hand, declared that he holds his residence in Pennsylvania and votes there. He said he was interested in business in Pennsylvania and is back and forth across the state line almost every day. He was admitted to bail later in the evening. Donald Gibson signing bond with him.
