Turning Back the Pages Of Andover History

TAKEN FROM THE FILES OF THE ANDOVER NEWS

Forty Years Ago MAY 25, 1892 Hamilton C. Norris, Editor

Oliver Jackson is building a new house on his lot on Greenwood street recently purchased by J. C. Green. The work is now well under way. E. Smith's bakery opened last Friday and has been doing a rushing business ever since. Attorney L. C. VanFleet has purchased from G. M. Barney six and one-half acres of land lying east of Grove street and adjoining the land already owned by Mr. VanFleet. He proposes to open a couple of new streets and lay a large portion of this land out into village lots. L. D. Cobb of Fort Worth, Texas has been in town a few days. Isaac Willets, the oil king of Bel- mont, died at his home in that place Friday. The funeral was held Mon- day. D. B. Spaulding has purchased the vacant lot on First street heretofore owned by Dr. W. W. Crandall. This is one of the most desirable build- ing lots in the village. The oil well on the R. A. Pease farm of which the News had a story of its shooting last week, is good for 12 to 15 barrels of oil per day, and flowers at frequent inter- vals. It is by all odds the best well in this field. One night last week some one wanted to know how much oil there was in the tank at the R. A. Pease oil well and stuck a lantern in the top of the tank to throw light on the subject. There was gas in the tank as well as oil and it wasn't half a second after the lantern went into the tank until the "whole business" was in flames. The tank was des- troyed and the exact quantity of oil it contained will never be known. The flow of the well is shut in until a new tank is obtained. Monday morning, J. A.
