

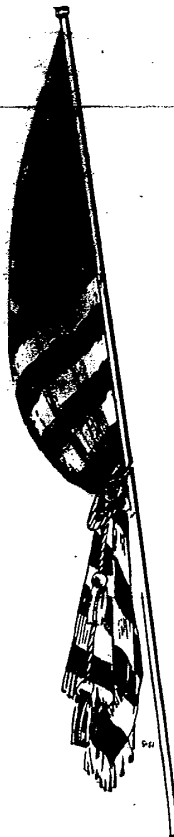
# MEMORIAL DAY
