Use for Irish Moss

Two-dollar-a-pound Irish moss from England lost its market in 1835, when the mayor of Boston announced that the Massachusetts coast had an ample supply. Further investigation showed that the moss covered rocks from North Carolina to Maine. The mayor's announcement led to the Irish moss industry at Setuare, which still exists. The moss is used in making blanc mange and many other puddings, and remedies for coughs. It also is an ingredient of some kalsomines, shoe stains, shaving soaps and dyes for calico printing.—National Geographic Society.

HEALTH in the HOME Practical Studies for Wives and Mothers By Dr. ERNEST H. LINES

PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS

SERIOUS accidents in the home are very common and often result in fatalities. The National Safety Council reports that in a recent year there were 25,000 fatal accidents in American homes and that over 9,000 of those who died were children under 15 years of age; also that there were 5 million non-fatal accidents in our homes. How safe is your home? Prevention is a thousand times better than cure and most of the accidents which occur at home could be prevented by a little care. Young children are very often the victims. Many of them lose their lives or suffer serious and painful injuries because of carelessness or negligence on the part of adult members of the family.

- 1. Fire and Stoves. Burning and scalding are the principal causes of death from home accidents among children. Don't allow romping and skylarking near the kitchen stove. Don't put a kettle of scalding or boiling water at the front of the stove. Any one passing may knock it over and get severely scalded. 2. Gas. Don't leave children alone in a room with a gas stove or where they can reach a gas jet. Accidentally or in play they may turn on the gas and be asphyxiated. Be sure rooms with gas jets are always well ventilated. Remember the kettle may boil over and put the gas out. 3. Electricity. Electric fans should be out of reach of little fingers. Always stop a fan before moving or adjusting it. Electric cords of lamps, reading lamps, irons, etc., should be renewed when they show signs of wear and tear.

QUESTIONS: All wives and mothers should be able to answer these questions: 1. What are the principal causes of accidental death among children in the home? 2. Name two ways in which serious accidents can occur while taking a bath? 3. Why should children be forbidden to put things in their mouths?
