CIVIC HEALTH REGULATIONS

An important factor which vitally affects the family and therefore deserves the earnest consideration of wives and mothers is civic health regulation. Most cities and states have public health departments only too anxious to apply the benefits of modern medicine to the general welfare. How much support do they get from the women of the community? They need all they can get for too often their efforts are handicapped and thwarted by selfish commercial interests.

Pure food laws, pure milk, water free from pollution, quarantine of infectious diseases—these and many other problems often involve up-hill fights by your health officer and he needs your support to carry out these measures, which are for the benefit of you and your families.

Or again, think of the many adults and children, bread-winners and their dependents, who are injured or killed by automobiles yearly. Many of these accidents are preventable and could be prevented if careless pedestrians and reckless drivers were properly educated and instructed. Another field for women's activities!

Many yet do not understand the economy of having their physician make periodical physical examinations of all members of their family, especially the children. Nobody doubts the wisdom of seeing the family dentist regularly. If it is admitted, and it is, that the teeth should be examined at regular intervals, how much more is it necessary to have the whole body examined regularly to find out if any decay has already started in any part of it.

It is much cheaper to pay to be kept well than to pay the cost of being made well after you are sick. Here is one place where business methods in the home will reap dividends in actual cash as well as in better health and a happier family.
