Organize Post V. of F. W.

A natural amphitheatre deep in a wooded section of the Ray Rogers farm near Whitesville, Sunday afternoon formed a beautiful setting for the institution of Wellsville Post, No. 2530, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, as state officials of the order and delegations from posts of a half dozen cities congregated to give the newest post in the state an auspicious send-off.

Officers were installed, the charter officially presented and Wellsville post duly recognized as a unit in the national organization. With ritualistic ceremonies over, the approximate 300 persons present gave their attention to a barbecue, their appetites whetted by preceding hours in the open air.

I. O. O. F. Memorial

The artificiality that has characterized the lives of so many in the past few decades must be done away with if we are to return to substantially normal conditions, Lloyd J. Babcock, Past Grand Master of the I. O. O. F. of this state declared before local and county Odd Fellows here Sunday afternoon at their annual memorial service.

Addressing an audience comprised in addition to Odd Fellows, Rebekahs, members of Canton Patriot Militant and the Canton Auxiliary, representing nearly 20 organizations in Allegany county, Mr. Babcock criticized the tendency of educators to lead students into despising manual labor and over-educating those who might be better fit to work with their hands instead of with their minds alone.
