Forty Years Ago

JULY 20, 1892

When near the bottom of the hill, the baby struck a good soft patch of mud, that must have been made especially for the occasion. Some workmen on the track saw the carriage coming and went to the rescue, finding the baby half frightened to death, but not seriously injured.
