The route from Wellsville to Buffalo for the new railroad, the Buffalo & Susquehanna, has recently been surveyed, and all necessary franchises and rights of way secured. Work on the construction of the road will soon begin.

A most interesting and delightful musicale was given at the M. E. parsonage Wednesday evening last. Forest Cheney, the renowned violinist, who is spending a few weeks in Andover, as guest of Charles Fickett gave the musicale.

The E. Trainor store was connected up by telephone Monday.

Summer resort people are almost discouraged over the continued cold wet weather.

Erie Detective Lynch, unloaded a gang of "Weary Willies" from a passing train here this morning in a hurry.

"Old Nig," the dray horse, with a trotting reputation, died this morning. Now the directors of the Andover Driving Association will undoubtedly arrange for further races. Some think they did not like to have an old dray horse win all the honors.

The Town Board let the contract for the construction of two new iron bridges to the Owego Bridge Company, yesterday at a cost of \$2,165 for the two complete, including the approaches. They are to be placed one over the stream at Elm Valley and the other over Dyke Creek, near Elijah Rollins'.

The Village Board has made arrangements with the Owego Bridge Company for the use of their pile driver to drive piles along the road by the "narrow" and protect the road from being washed out in that locality.

While Andover had 23 bridges washed out by the flood of July 6th and seven more upset, her damage is light compared with that of other places. Only one of the 23 bridges were valuable ones and that can be replaced at an expense of \$150, and placed in a position where such a bridge is needed. It was always too small for the Rollins crossing.

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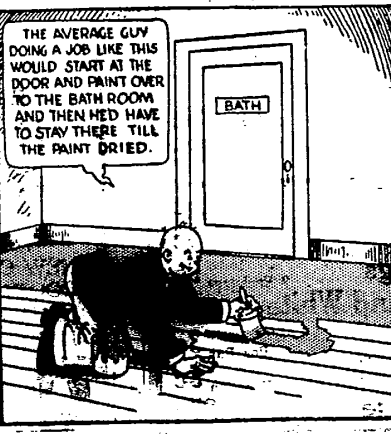
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
