Gem Long Prized

Motors' Poculiarity

That airplane motors operate more efficiently early in the morning than at any time is one of the mysteries of mechanics which automotive engineers have vainly tried to solve. It is an established fact that for a period slightly before dawn at the earth's surface to an hour afterward an airplane motor operates at its highest efficiency. A similar aithough modified effect is noted for a like period immediately after sunset. Automobile motors on the ground are affected, but in a lesser degree. The aquamarine is among the oldest of gems. It is simply a transparent variety of beryl, typically of a buish green color. Hence the name, meaning "sea water." The emerald is another variety of beryl, a stone which, in its various tints, was much prized by the ancients. There are many Greek integlios of these gems, displaying the finest workmanship. The beryl was one of the stones of the breast-plate of the Jewish high priest, and the Roman jewelers, who put it to a number of purposes, anticipated one of the popular modern uses of the aquamarine by making ear pendants of it. The aquamarine is among the oldest Shaw's View of Life


