### Sinclair's Win Pennant

The Allegany County Baseball League pennant for 1932 belongs to Wellsville as a result of this week-end's victories over Belmont, traditional rival of the local aggregation, which now has only two more games to play next week-end with Bolivar. Fillmore's defeat in Saturday's contest with Olean sealed the Sinclair's chance for the coveted championship, which will afford the locals the opportunity of playing champion teams from other leagues in this section.

The President's Cup, a coveted trophy awarded annually by the local golf and country club to the winner of the tournament here, went Monday to Bayard Haskins who defeated William R. McEwen Thursday in a 36 hole match which tallied five up and four to play. ### Lunn Gets

#### Material Contract

In the competitive bidding on contracts for supplying materials for the \$30,000 sewage and drainage project voted upon a fortnight ago at the last village board meeting, Frank E. Lunn, local coal, lumber and builders' materials supply merchant had his offer tentatively accepted by the village board at its meeting Monday night.

His bid, amounting to \$1,585.69, was nearly \$600 less than the highest bid, \$2,167.20, made by Leon J. Hopkins, a local competitor. The bid next lowest to that made by the Lunn concern was \$1,646.44, by the F. R. Chamberlain company another coal and builders' supplies firm located here.

### Woman's Life Saved

For the second time this year Mrs. Twyla McGill, 18 year old wife of Eugene McGill, is in the Jones Memorial hospital, ill from inhaling gas. At the hospital, attendants said she responded to resuscitation treatment and would probably recover. Neighbors of the young woman smelled gas and broke into her home shortly before noon to find Mrs. McGill lying on the bed. She was unconscious. The young woman had a similar experience on April 6th. Dr. F. E. McCarty, attending Mrs. McGill, said she was the victim of attacks of melancholia.

Daily average production of crude oil in the U. S. in the week ending July 30 totaled 2,131,666 barrels, a decrease of 66,093 barrels from the preceding week, according to the Oil and Gas Journal. In the corresponding week of 1931 crude oil production averaged 2,490,423 barrels daily.

It is believed that the total production for the month of July in both areas will show a decline under that recorded for June due to the further restriction of the buyers and that this decrease will be strictly in line with the variable call.
