### Forty Years Ago

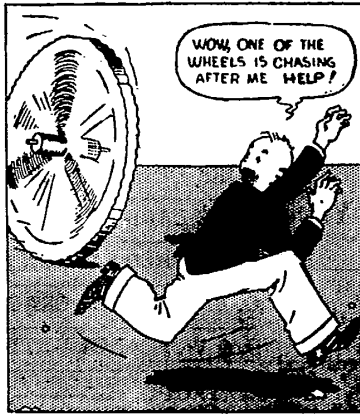
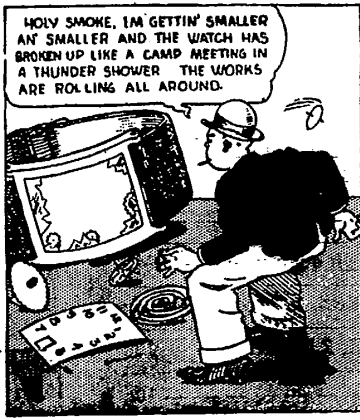
