The 87th annual fair is almost upon us. Allegany county for 87 years has invited her sons and daughters to spend three days on the fair grounds at Angelica just about this time of year. Fun galore—free attractions of the finest type, the best fire works, good races, interesting exhibits, quality concessions, amusing rides, peppy bands—everything to make these three days memorable thruout the year. Forty Years Ago

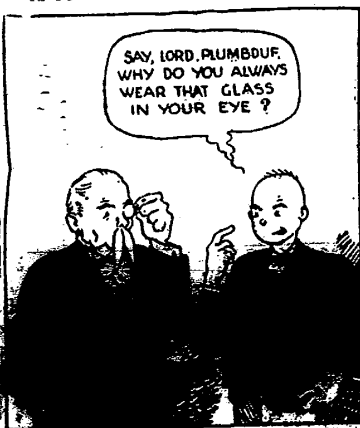
