New York, Aug. 15.—Scottie, a collie that was rescued from a dog pound in Kansas City six years ago, now belongs to the Legion of Hero Dogs, a group which includes only about 50 dogs in this country.

Scottie won his distinction by his faithfulness in leading his owner, Mr. W. R. Duckett, blind fur dealer of Franklin, Neb., to classes in the Columbia University summer session for three seasons to work for his Master's degree. The collie not only took his master to the classrooms, but sat and waited for him thru all his classes.

With the closing of the session, in which Mr. Duckett completed his work for his degree, the New York Anti-Vivisection Society announced that Scottie had been admitted to the legion. The medal which goes with the award was presented to Scottie on Saturday. Scottie is the second dog to receive the award for service to the blind, Mrs. Diana Belais, president of the society said.

On Time

Well, friends, the editor of Baker's Hardware News and his family are again in Canada, and are located in a summer cottage on the shore of Lake Nipissing, three miles from North Bay, Ontario.

It is a beautiful spot with a clean sand beach and fine swimming right in our front yard, while except for an occasional island, the broad waters of this lake stretch away to the west as far as the eye can reach.

The weather is warm and we have had rain enough so the air is clear and invigorating; too bad that Allegany county could not have some of this moisture, which is interfering with the late haying and harvest in this locality. All thru this North Country the farmers are complaining of an unusually wet season, even farther south much wheat is still in shock which should have been in and threshed some weeks ago.

Right now the tourist migration is at its height and the volume appears about equal to last year, but we notice a great decline in the number of cars carrying United States licenses, not more than one-half the usual number of U. S. A. cars are on the road thru any of the territory we have visited.

The three big lumber mills on the bay at Callander are cutting less than one-half their usual quota, they did not start operating until June. One has already shut down and the others will close on September 3rd. They usually run until ice on the lake prevents the movement of logs, but the yards are piled to capacity and the out shipments of cut lumber is so light that it seems folly to pile up more.

Next week I will try to tell you something of general business conditions thru the sections of Ontario that we have visited.
