Bolivar

Two rattlesnakes, each about 40 inches in length, are on exhibition in the front window of the Frick-Reid store here. The reptiles are attracting much attention.

The deep well being drilled by the Belmont Quadrangle Drilling Corporation on the Ballard farm, town of Wirt, had reached a depth of 2,670 feet today. The Waugh and Porter formation was cased off at 1,500 feet.

This district comprises the counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauque, Erie, Niagara, Wyoming, Orleans and Seneca.

The production of the Bradford field for week ending Aug. 27, averaged 26,546 barrels daily, or 1,444 barrels greater than the average for the prior week. Compared with the production for the past seven weeks, the gatherings indicated a decrease of 574 barrels a day. The production of the Allegany field averaged 7,151 barrels daily, a decline of 120 barrels under the prior week's performance. The production exactly equals the average for the seven previous weeks and indicated that considerable less crude must be produced in September to be in line with the further decreased demands of the buyers.
