Solomon, whose knowledge of natural history was deep and keen, had a faithful imitation of Agur, the son of Jakeb, who knew of that frightful habit of the raven, the picking out the eyes of young or sickly lambs, so killing them, and with judicial wisdom applies that habit parabolically as follows: "The eye that mocketh at his father, and despiseth to obey his mother, the ravens of the valley shall pick it out." (Proverbs, 80:17).
