This nostrum, you are assured, is good for everything from snake bite to gangrene! It was being exploited as a cure for ivy poisoning, common at this season. Somebody in desipair had "swabbed the infected area in-it acted like magic." The exploiting dramatist said the victim had accidentally touched "poison oak." That name is an ancient as the nostrum racket. Poison oak, indeed.

Absolute ignorance was shown in the reference to "the infected" area. I'vy poisoning is not an "infection." No more than a burn by fire is an infection. It is simply an intense acid irritation—no infectionerems involved in the process. I have an idea that ivy acid would destroy many infecting micro-organisms.
