## Wellsville

### Sinclair Team Now Champions of District

Wellsville, Sept. 11.—By defeating Blasdel here Sunday, 14 to 2, after taking Saturday's contest 4 to 3, the Wellsville Sinclair base ball nine became the champions of the Buffalo District of the suburban leagues. The win was assured when Lackawanna, the nearest rival, was defeated today by Springville. Four pitchers were unable to stem the tide of hits which followed from the bats of the locals Sunday. When the dust had cleared, two home runs, two three-base hits and three two-baggers were among the 15 hits, which netted 14 runs.

Wellsville has won five of the six games in the series, losing only to Lackawanna three weeks ago. Two games were taken from Springville and Blasdel and one was secured from Lackawanna. A game still remains to be played between Blasdel and Lackawanna, but will have no bearing on the standings. The Sinclair nine started scoring in the third when they netted four tallies on three-baggers by Kizer and Nichols, a single by Simons and a homer by DeBarbieri. The team batted around in the seventh, scoring nine runs, including two by Kizer in the inning. Kent completed the scoring in the eighth with a homer.

### To Improve Street

The Wellsville street improvement program carried out during the past few years was continued here with the announcement that South Broad street would be graded and resurfaced at an estimated cost of \$3,000. Archie Blades of Hornell was given the contract for the work, which includes laying and rolling down the new top in two courses. The first course will be a binder rolled to a thickness of two inches and the second course of topping will be one inch thick. The material will be hot asphalt. About three days will be necessary for the actual laying of the surface. South Broad street was given a new storm water drain and new concrete curb and gutters last year. Work will begin on the new project this week, it is expected. From 400 to 450 tons of material will be used.

The cheese market in Cuba today was 12 1/2c, Plymouth, Wis., Sept. 2, 11c for twins; Gouverneur, N. Y., Sept. 3rd, 11c for twins.

Cuba is soon to have a village ordinance, prohibiting the manufacture, sale, transportation or possession of liquor. Violations will constitute disorderly conduct and the penalty will be a fine of \$100.

The production of the Allegany field for the week ending Sept. 8, was an average of 7,118 barrels daily. This is comparable with 7,151 barrels for the prior week and with 7,240 barrels average for the previous four weeks.

Daily average production of crude oil in the United States in the week ended Sept. 3rd totaled 2,103,504 barrels, an increase of 3,677 barrels over the preceding week, according to the Oil and Gas Journal.

Wells completed in the Eastern fields last month show a slight decrease from the July total, according to statistics just released, while production in this area shows a considerable falling off. In the Bradford field completions decreased while production gained.

Funeral services were held at the Kellogg home, Tuesday afternoon, Rev. T. Garland Smith of Wellsville officiating. Burial was made in the Greenwood cemetery.

### High Pressure Well Expected Here

Preparations are being made to bring in a gas well on the H. B. Warner farm in Rock Creek which gives indication of being a high pressure well.

A good show of gas was discovered Labor Day by driller C. L. Sample. The lease is held by the Witter Oil and Gas Company of Pittsburgh.

The Oriskany sand was reached at a depth of 4,548 feet. Men are now busy digging a pit which will be filled with about 36 tons of concrete. A bi-pass cap will be installed before operations are resumed. These precautions are being taken to avoid a wild cat well such as one brought in in the Tioga field last year. The well is being watched with great interest by hundreds of people as it is expected to open a new field.
