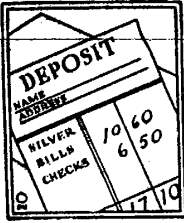

A delegation of hotel men recently called upon Hon. George S. Henry, the Premier of Ontario, and almost convinced that gentleman that the hotel business was being throttled by Government control of the liquor question, and that the hotels should be licensed to sell beer and wine. The Premier allowed that he believed a system that would permit hotels to serve wine and beer might be worked out.

So it appears that a wedge to split the much lauded Government Control Liquor Act of Ontario is soon to be inserted.

Government Control in Ontario is having hard sledding, the bootlegging fraternity of this province are quite as much a thorn in the side of the enforcement authorities as in the States.

Alcohol may be bought in Quebec for \$2.00 a gallon, but when brought into Ontario it immediately becomes salable at \$8.00 or more per gallon so the bootlegger thrives and the minions of the law seem quite as helpless in the matter as do our own U. S. envoys of law and order.

Personally, I fail to observe where Government Control has any advantage over our system in making prohibition prohibit or suppressing any of the evils that the wets contend are chargeable to the 18th Amendment and the Volstead Act. Let a better way be found for the control of the liquor question before we smash the legislation we already have.
