Wellsville

Girl Killed by Auto

Glenn A. Williams, Cuba, has been exonerated from all blame in connection with the fatal injuries sustained by Mary Eleanor Lee, eight-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lee, 48 Wheeler Place, when the child was struck by his automobile Sunday afternoon.

The child died in Jones Memorial hospital Monday morning at 3:15 o'clock, without regaining consciousness. A fractured skull and other injuries were responsible for her death.

The little girl was walking along the Wellsville-Allentown road a short distance outside of Wellsville in company with three other girls. According to reports filed with the state police, Williams was driving a small sedan in the direction of Wellsville. The children were walking along the left side of the highway in the same direction. Reports say the little girl ran directly in front of the oncoming car. The car left the road after striking the child but no one else was hurt.

Charles Gamble, East Main street, Cuba and Charles and Herman Hinkle, brothers, of Buffalo, were witnesses to the accident. Gamble was with Williams.

Mary Eleanor was a student in the Immaculate Conception school. She was born in Wellsville July 24, 1924, a daughter of David W. and Josephine McCarthy Lee, and had always lived here. Besides her parents, she is survived by the following brothers and sisters, all at home: Gerald, Virginia, Catherine, Chester and Josephine.

Funeral services were held in Immaculate Conception church, Wednesday at 9:30 a. m., the Rev. Michael Gallagher officiating. Interment in Sacred Heart cemetery.

test well on the Ballard farm, town of Wirt, was held up for a while Tuesday when a pocket of gas was struck at a depth of 3,940 feet. The gas was found in a brown shale, but soon petered out. The well is to be drilled to a depth of about 4,500 feet unless gas is struck at a lesser depth.

For week ending Sept. 17 the production of the Bradford field averaged 26,180 barrels daily for the prior week and with 27,279 barrels for the month of August. The production of the Allegany field last week averaged 6,809 barrels daily comparable with 6,863 for the prior week and with 7,419 for August.

er have been practically abandoned because of the continued flow of salt water with the gas. Drilling has been stopped for a time, while materials for experimental purposes are being sent here. An open flow of 800,000 cubic feet has been recorded. The well blew water over the top of the derrick for 40 minutes at a time, and several times when the tools were pulled from the casing the well turned into a gusher of gas and salt water.

There is no question but what there is gas to be found in the vicinity of the present operations. It is believed that more drilling apparatus will be put to work to start other wells, although nothing definite has been announced by representatives of the companies holding leases here.

Property owners are interested in drill trucks being used for gas prospecting in this vicinity. These trucks are equipped with small drilling outfits which drill into the ground and explode a charge of nitro glycerine and record vibrations in an effort to ascertain whether or not gas may be found.

Many tests have been made on various properties around Greenwood, but the results of such tests and the firms for which the tests were made have been withheld by operators.

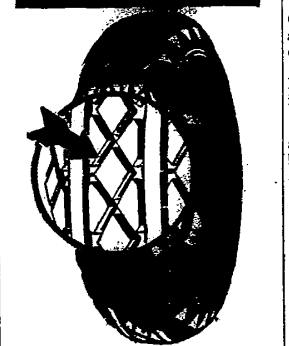
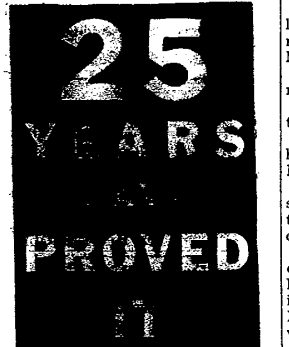
