Girl Killed by Auto

Glenn A. Williams, Cubs, has been exonerated from all blame in connection with the fatal injuries sustained by Mary Eleanor Lee, eight-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lee, 48 Wheeler Place, when the child was struck by his automobile Sunday afternoon.

The child died in Jones Memorial hospital Monday morning at 3:15 o'-clock, without regaining consciousness. A fractured skull and other injuries were responsible for her death.

The little girl was walking along the Wellsville-Allentown road a short distance outside of Wellsville in company with three other girls. According to reports filed with the state police, Williams was driving a small sedan in the direction of Wellsville. The children were walking along the left side of the highway in the same direction. Reports say the little girl ran directly in front of the oncoming car. The car left the road after striking the child but no one else was hurt.
