Franklin D. Roosevelt Will be Our Thirty-First President

Herbert H. Lehman Elected Governor of the State of New York by a Majority of 1,867,590.—Robert F. Wagner, United States Senator, Leads Them All in Majorities.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Governor of New York State, was chosen as President of the United States by the largest majority ever given a candidate. Eighty-five per cent. of the votes cast last Tuesday for President were cast for Roosevelt. He carried 42-states of the 48. Hoover taking but six.

As the tabulations of Tuesday's election are closing, a continued reinforcement in the tremendous popular vote by which Roosevelt and Garner have amassed majorities in states having 472 electoral units and left Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis with but 59.

The late returns have served only to emphasize the immensity of the Democratic sweep that embraced th entire country. With less than a scattered quarter of the nation's precincts remaining uncounted, the Rooseve majorities had been rolled up in 42 states.

State Senate Democratic

New York, Nov. 9.—By a margin f one seat the Democrats appeared today to have seized control of the state senate, which is standing: 2 Democrats, 25 Republicans. The standing up to yesterday was 27 Republicans, 24 Democrats. Democrats gained three seats and lost one, for net increase of 2. Democratic upsets were scored in the 17th Manhattan district, where Albert Wald triumphed, and in the Oneida and triumphed respectively. with two contests undecided.
