## Wellsville

### H. Ross Hobarts, Allegany Deputy, Taken by Death

H. Ross Hobarts, deputy sheriff here under Sheriff Daniel W. Witter at Belmont, died suddenly Sunday morning at Jones Memorial hospital, the victim of double pneumonia, following an illness of only five days. He would have been 44 years old on November 19th.

Deputy Sheriff Roberts, after campaigning actively for the Republican ticket in Allegany county, became ill Tuesday morning when physicians diagnosed his illness as grip. His condition grew steadily worse and he was removed to the hospital Thursday. The progress of the pneumonia was rapid and he succumbed at 9:45 o'clock Sunday morning.

His death is attributed in part to the intense campaigning he carried on during the past few weeks in support of Edson A. Brigham, who runs for sheriff in Allegany. Mr. Roberts himself was a candidate for sheriff in the primaries, earlier this year, but withdrew in favor of Mr. Brigham.

Deputy Sheriff Roberts, a son of John J. and Minnie Hovey Roberts, was a resident of Wellsville for the past three years and was widely known throughout the county. At different times he resided in Buffalo, Rochester, Depew and Olean. He was engaged at one time in real estate in Buffalo and Rochester and once operated grocery stores in Ceres and Depew. For two years he was a member of the Merchants Credit Bureau of Wellsville.

### Youth is Shot in Left Thigh

William D. Yerrick, Jr., 14 years old, of 19 Lunn court, Wellsville, was resting comfortably at Jones Memorial hospital here Monday morning, following a hunting accident Friday afternoon at 4 p. m. when he was shot in the left thigh.

Young Yerrick was accompanying his father and another companion on a hunting trip in the woods near Elm Valley and was not carrying a gun. The companion, a youth whose name Yerrick's father would not reveal, was examining a gun when it was discharged accidentally, the bullet penetrating William's thigh and glancing off his right leg.

Aided by the youth whose gun caused the injury, Mr. Yerrick carried his son to his automobile parked about a half mile away and took him to the hospital here. At the hospital an x-ray was taken to determine if the bullet injured the bone. Dr. L. S. Benedict, who is caring for the boy, said the wound was painful but not serious and that Yerrick would be able to return to his home in a few days.

The record in Bradford is the lowest one for any week in 15 months. The record in Allegany is the second lowest one for the same period. The reduced production indicates the effort being made by all buyers to restrict their purchases so as to keep them in line with the refinery demand.

Alfred, N. Y.—Saxon athletes were victorious in cross country and Varsity football, but the freshmen met defeat, 20-6 at the hands of Niagara freshmen.

For the eighth consecutive year Alfred harriers won the Little Ten Conference. The scores were: Alfred, 23; Rochester, 47; Hamilton, 63; Hobart, 79. Alfred will participate in one more meet, Allegany at Meadeville, Nov. 12, before the Middle Atlantic at Van Cortland Park, New York City, Nov. 21.

After suffering three defeats, the Varsity football squad came back for a 7-0 win over Hobart at Geneva last Saturday. Until the last few minutes of play the score was 0-0 with the teams quite equally matched. A pass, Torello to Wallace, who carried the ball over, netted the winning touchdown for Alfred.

Private donations in seven different collections make an interesting part of the 50,000 volumes now available for use at Alfred University library.

The building itself, a Carnegie foundation, was built in 1912. In 1931 a grant of \$6,000, also thru the Carnegie Corporation, was made available over a period of three years, \$2,000 each year to buy new books.

The various collections are: Alfredana, 455 volumes; Bertha B. Hamilton, 500 volumes; Dr. Lewis, 700; denominational, 1,500; Burdick, 500; Annex, 2,000; and Gothic collection, 1,600 volumes. Some of these collections consist largely of literary works, some of history, while others contain rare books and pamphlets often more valuable for their history than their content. One collection is in Ladies' Hall, popularly called the Brick, and one in the seminary building, but the regular library volumes are all available in the main library.

New books are continually being added so that students have access to the latest books in science, research and literature.

"From the Air" will be the topic of the address by Wm. L. Markham in assembly on Thursday, Nov. 17. He will illustrate his lecture with numerous pictures of American scenes which he has taken "from the air."

## New Houghton Church Building Progresses

Not for many miles distant from this vicinity can be found a building similar in construction and proportion to the new Tabernacle church now being erected in Houghton. The Houghton church serves not only the village, but also the students and faculty of Houghton college as a place of worship. Consequently, with the rapid growth of the college student body during the past few years the old church has become inadequate and the present building project highly necessary.

The steel workers have completed their structural work, and a force of carpenters are now rapidly pushing along the rough work.

The building is a steel and brick structure with a seating capacity of 700 and with provision for larger audiences. The plans call for individual Sunday School class rooms adequate to take care of the rapid growing Sunday School in this place. Provisions are being made likewise for pipe organ, pastor's study, and rest rooms. The style is simple, dignified and churchlike in appearance.
