Humble Beginnings of Sunday School System
The Sunday school, as first established, was, as its name indicates, a school for meeting on Sunday and went beyond the purely religious in its instruction. The first school so established is credited to a resident

of Gloucester, England, one Robert Raikes, who regularly on Sunday collected all the children he could find on the streets and took them to his school, where teachers he hired at 25 cents a day taught them. The first school was established in 1780. Its curriculum included letters, reading and the church catechism. Raikes' school was followed by another in London in 1784, established by a Rowland Hill. These schools were day-long affairs. They usually met at 8 a. m. and continued in session until church services began. At the conclusion of the church service the school work was resumed and continued until 5:30 p. m. While religious instruction was given to the young on Sundays in the new England colonies, the first regularly organized Sunday school in this country is generally attributed to Bishop Asbury and was believed to have been located in Hanover, Va.

Had Small Interest in That Kind of Weather
