## Wellsville

### Struck by Car

Hurrying home after a rehearsal of a Christmas program in the Gospel tabernacle, West Pearl street late Sunday afternoon, William Shelley, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Shelley of 100 Howard street, was struck and knocked down by a car and now lies in the Jones Memorial hospital with a fractured right femur.

### To Vote on Sewers

Wellsville taxpayers will be asked to vote on two questions in regard to the proposal to install a new sanitary sewer system in the village, it was decided at a meeting Monday night. The board adopted a formal resolution calling for a special election on the proposition, and set the date for Tuesday, Dec. 20. The proposition will be whether to construct a sanitary sewer system and whether to issue bonds of the village in a sum not to exceed \$275,000 to cover the cost of the project. The board studied plans for retiring the bonds over a long period of years, several methods being discussed. The plan likely to be adopted will tend to keep the immediate cost of the project to a minimum. If the proposition is approved, the work will be done under village supervision, by hand labor, thereby affording employment to a maximum number of Wellsville residents and meriting increased state aid.
