The Law Catches up Again

Mrs. Hazel M. Hutton, 41 years old, a domestic, claiming Westfield, Pa., as her residence was sentenced by Judge Renwick to from one to two years in the state prison for women at Westfield State Farm, Bedford Hills, where she was taken.

In 1933 she cashed a check for \$35 in a Wellsville store, signed with her own name when she had no funds in the bank and was arrested early in October. She admitted her guilt and promised restitution. Sentence was deferred Jan. 26, 1934, and probation for three years ordered.

Mrs. Hutton did not report as ordered and never made restitution and for several months officers endeavored to locate her. It was learned that she was in Gold and her arrest followed.

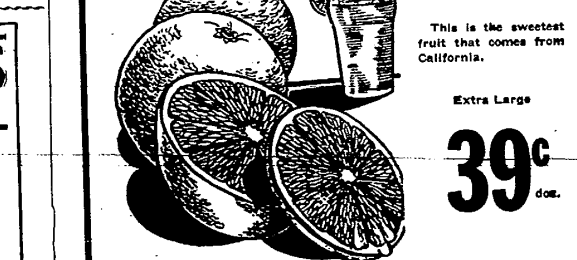

HIGHWAY HIGHLIGHTS How's Your Knowledge of Cars, Roads & Travel? DAILY 2,300,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN RIDE BUSES. Q. How many buses are engaged in transporting children back and forth from schools in the U. S.? A. Approximately 66,000 which carry 2,374,488 children daily. Q. Are the main highways of the various states of value to the Federal Government or the nation as a whole? A. Yes, these through routes are vastly important to mail delivery and to national defense. Q. What means are being used to prevent skidding of automobiles? A. The use of non-slippery pavements, tire retreading when worn smooth and, in addition to chains, a non-skid tire cover has been patented. Q. Are fees and gasoline taxes collected from motorists a representative coverage tax? A. No. In most states only one in six persons owns and operates an automobile. This reason is advanced by those who oppose the use of motorists' taxes for any use other than highway or street improvement. Q. How can touring be made more comfortable in the hottest weather? A. Place a cake of ice in a closed car so that air entering the car from a down-draft cowl or windshield ventilator passes over the ice. Q. Has road improvement increased traveling for pleasure? A. Good indication is given by figures of the National Park Service showing an increase of 140 per cent in the number of visitors at National Parks in recent years. 92 per cent traveled by automobile.
