## NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR REGENTS' DIPLOMA OFFERED

Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 a meeting of the Junior and Senior Classes was held at which Mr. Bretch told them of the revised requirements for Regents diplomas. The requirements do not differ greatly but are more liberal.

Formerly four years of English History C and either History A or B, two units in either mathematics or science, a three unit sequence in either language, mathematics, science, or history and five elective subjects were required.

By the revised requirements four years of English, General Science, History C, Ninth Grade Social Science, a three unit sequence, two units in mathematics, science, history, art, music, business subjects, homemaking, agriculture, industrial arts or such subjects which are taught by the school, and electives totalling 16 units are necessary.

Sixteen units instead of 15 are required to graduate by the new diploma, but each English counts one unit instead of three-fourths of a unit.

Social science has never been taught in this high school. It includes civics, economic citizenship and vocational guidance. It is regularly a Freshmen subject but the last half of this year will be offered to the Juniors and possibly a few Seniors. It will be just economic citizenship because all high school pupils at the present time passed civics while in the Eighth grade.

However, diplomas will still be issued based on both types of requirements for probably three years, more so the people who have started their schedules will not have to change their plans.

The Andover High School girls' basketball team will meet Hornell girls here for their second contest on the local court this Friday, Jan. 11th. Andover has a very fast team and is expected to give the Hornell girls a grand game. Hornell was from Andover last year.
