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Dog Owners' Notice

Dog licenses for 1934 expired on December 31st, 1934. The 1935 license fee is due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January 1 to December 31, 1935. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License fees: Male dog, \$2.25; female dog, \$1.75; spayed female dog, \$1.25. These amounts include license fee.

No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog is liable by law incurring a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The clerk of the city or town and the police departments of cities are authorized to issue licenses in January of each year.

The name of an owner of a dog, the name of the dog, the name of the harborer or police list number of the dog, and the name of the owner from whom the dog was licensed.

If a dog is not licensed last year and is not licensed this year, so advise the clerk of the city or town of Andover.
