Federal aid is being given the army in the project. New York State has received a check of \$2,661.66 for royalties on the Empire Gas & Fuel Co. well at Greenwood in the reforestation area. It was in payment for 31,312.490 cubic feet of gas used during December. The royalty is eight and one-half cents per 1,000. Allentown residents were startled by an explosion Tuesday evening of last week which rocked the buildings and broke several windows. The explosion was traced to a cement pump house at the home of Rowald Adams. The building is used for the water supply pump for the house. The Oswayo Valley Mail carried an interesting write-up last week describing the private collection of Civil War relics owned by William Dean Richmond of Shinglehouse, Pa. Mr. Richmond has 582 authentic pieces of both Union and Confederate relics from famous battlefields, including bullets, bayonets, knives, guns and equipment which he has collected in several trips made by him to Southern battlefields.

Ward Man Wins Negligence Case... A verdict of \$345 for personal injuries was awarded in Supreme Court Monday to Elmer Rifenburg of the town of Ward. The award is against the Allegany Motor Coach Company of Olean, sued following an accident on the Wellsville-Bolivar road last May, when a company bus struck a team driven by Rifenburg in which he was injured. the person making it as a fraud. Information regarding examinations for the United States Civil Service may be obtained from the boards of United States Civil Service Examiners. There is such a board in each community which has a postoffice of the first or second class. In nearly all cities the civil service board is located at the post office. Before paying money for tuition, or signing a contract, it is advisable to make inquiry concerning the prospect of examinations. There is rea-

son to believe that agents of some schools deceive the public as to the probability of early examinations. No school has advance information regarding the need for employees or the probability of examinations.
