FREE MILK DISTRIBUTION ENDS

Teachers have reported visible improvement of the physical condition of many of their pupils as a result of the milk distribution and it is hoped that if the free distribution of milk is not extended, parents will make an attempt to provide some milk in their children's diet.

ACROSS THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

With the prevalence of measles and scarlet fever in neighboring communities, I believe parents should be informed concerning the symptoms of these diseases and the present regulations regarding quarantine as related to school attendance.

The State Department of Health now believes that a rigid quarantine on cases of measles is not justified and tends to defeat its purpose by encouraging concealment of cases. The primary object is the prevention of deaths by proper medical and nursing care. Measles is very dangerous to children under three years old, but school children nearly always recover unless they are in poor physical condition or are not properly cared for during illness.

Present regulations require that the patient be isolated, that is, kept in a separate room apart from other children. Other children in the family may attend school, but both parents and teachers should be very alert for symptoms and if any develop, the child should be kept at home. Measles begin with a fever followed by symptoms like a cold in the head, with running nose, sneezing, and inflamed and watery eyes. Then the characteristic rash appears on the third or fourth day.

Teachers in Andover High School have been instructed to watch carefully for these symptoms and parents are advised to do the same. If a case of measles occurs, it should be reported to the school or health authorities and great care should be taken that no other children be admitted to the sick room, even for a short time.

Scarlet fever is a more serious disease. The onset is sudden, with headache, fever, sore throat and often vomiting. A finely diffused rash appears, usually within 24 hours. In cases of scarlet fever the State Health Department requires a rigid quarantine, not only on the patient, but on other children in the family. All cases should be reported and given proper medical care.

To date there have been no cases of scarlet fever in Andover and only one case of measles.
