Federal Housing Plan Meets Approval In This District

Loans for property improvement in Western New York made under the Federal Housing Plan, increased seven per cent in January, 1935, as compared with December, 1934, according to a report issued February 12th by Arthur M. East, associate director of the Buffalo district, Federal Housing Administration, which includes Allegany county. Modernization loans in January maintained an average of \$4,484 daily, bringing the total of loans made in this territory up to \$512,804.04. This shows an increase of \$54,912.37 from January 16 to 30. Modernization and repair pledges for an estimated total of \$267,225 were made in the territory during the week of February 4th, secured from a total of 6,764 canvass calls made to home owners in connection with house-to-house canvasses in 20 localities. This brings to a total of \$3,111,468 the estimated value of pledges made since September 1. Loans may now be made from \$1 to \$2,000, Mr. East points out. Previous statements that loans could only be made within the bracket of \$100 to \$2,000 were made under the assumption that banks would not desire to loan smaller sums.
