

# A blow to the people of New York State

The Excess Crew Bill before the Legislature of New York will cost the railroads of this state millions of dollars, wastefully spent.

Who will pay this bill? The industries and the people of New York. The bill can only be paid by increasing railroad rates, which industry and the people must pay.

Who benefits by this bill? No one.

The Full Crew Bill should be called the Excess Crew Bill. It adds extra trainmen to the number now required without in any way increasing either efficiency or safety.

The move to put extra men on trains where they are not needed is like passing laws requiring two men to run a one-man machine, two men on every plow. It is just as extreme and unnecessary as that.

## Effect on Railroad Labor

The temporary effect of this proposed legislation will be to increase the number or engine and train service employees.

However its inevitable effect will be to advance the cost of railroad transportation, driving business away from the rail lines, thereby decreasing the number of train and engine service employees and every other form of railroad employment. Furthermore, the enactment of such a law would put on still further the ability of the Railroads to return to duty those thousands of men previounly employed in every branch of the service.
