Miss Adelaide Horton of Niagara Falls and Gilbert Smigard of New York City, students of the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University, were honored as St. Patrick and Queen over the third annual St. Patrick festival of the university last Wednesday. They were chosen by popular student vote. The ceremonies and costumes in the grand parade and formal ball were exceptionally fine.

The popular Alfred queen ascended the throne at the annual festival in a coronation ceremony both picturesque and beautiful, crowned in white and gold crepe with a train of green brocade trimmed in silver. She carried a high bouquet of mixed flowers.

St. Patrick, regally attired, under escort of a train of guards, dignified and gracious greeted his queen with great honors. They were attended by two flower girls and ten maids of honor charmingly gowned.

The St. Patrick festival is among the finest events of the college year at Alfred and attracted nearly 1,000 visitors this year.

**A DISH FOR THE WEEK**

Dried cheese need not be thrown away or used only to bait the mouse trap. It may be grated and stored in a glass jar with a rubber in the refrigerator or a cold place. Then when a slightly different flavor is desired, the grated cheese may be added to such dishes as cheese and potatoes.

**Cheese and Potatoes**  
 3 cups of raw potatoes, sliced thin  
 3/4 cup of fat  
 13 tablespoons of grated cheese  
 2 cloves  
 Garlic or onion, chopped fine  
 2 teaspoons of salt  
 1/2 teaspoon of pepper.

Place the potatoes, cheese, fat and seasoning in alternate layers in a baking dish. Cover the dish tightly and bake in a moderate oven until the potatoes are tender, about an hour. Serve the combination with a garnish of parsley.

Cheese and potatoes, lettuce salad with tart French dressing, and whole wheat bread and butter for the grown-ups; baked potato, whole-wheat bread and lettuce sandwiches for the children; and strawberry jam, baked apples and milk for all make an appealing luncheon or supper menu for the family, says the New York State college of home economics.

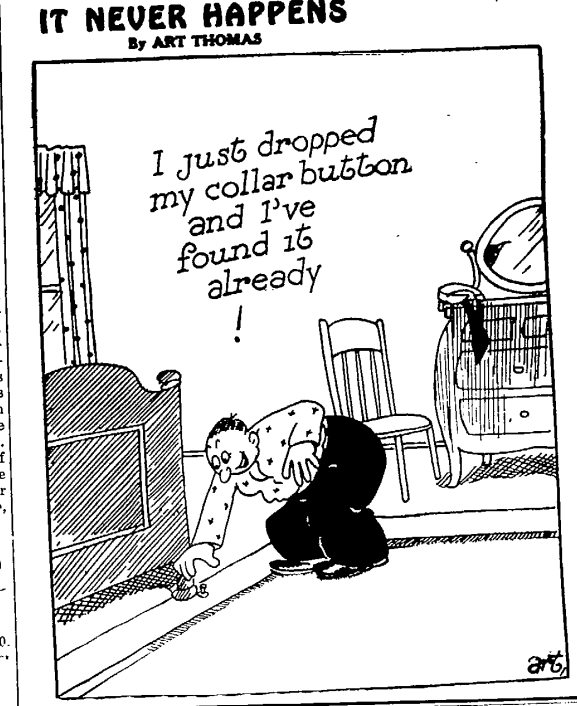
