4-H WORKERS LEARN AND EARN

Livestock Management is Becoming More Popular, H. A. Willman Reports.

Judged by enrollments in New York State, work with livestock is becoming more popular with farm boys and girls, says H. A. Willman of the state college of agriculture. "This work attracted 1,188 members in 1927 and 3,363 in 1934, with dairy enrollments showing the largest increase in numbers. Since 1927 the number of 4-H Club members who work with livestock has increased from about 13 per cent to 24 per cent in 1934.

"The fattening of lambs has made money for some young folks. Five hundred lambs, owned by 67 club members in 12 counties, sold for nearly \$5,000 at the second annual Buffalo show and sale. Counties that took part in that show and sale were Erie, Allegany, Livingston, Wyoming, Genesee, Ontario, Monroe, Onondaga, Cayuga, Tompkins, Otsego and Schuyler.

"Forty-six club members from five New York counties sold \$6,156 worth of baby beef in the first annual New York State baby beef sale. Exclusive of state fair premiums the typical steer showed a profit of nearly \$21 above feed costs.

"Work with dairy animals," Mr. Willman says, "emphasizes production records, record-keeping, showing and judging. Boys and girls learn how to build herds. A study of this type of work in Broome, Chemung, Chenango, and Dutchess counties shows that dairy cows kept by 4-H Club members are producing satisfactorily."

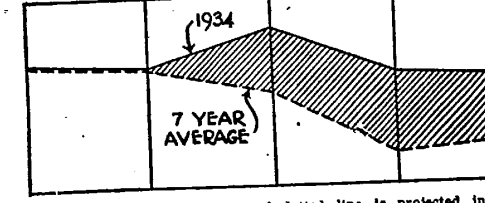
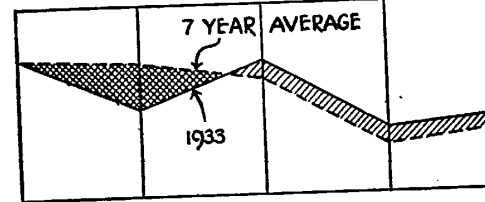
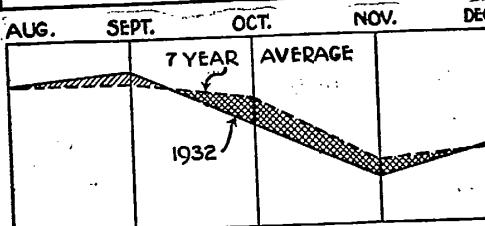

State Milk Campaign Turns Tide



EVIDENCE indicating success of the New York State advertising and educational campaign to increase milk consumption is found in figures of milk receipts in the New York metropolitan area as published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. From these reports statisticians have figured the average trend of milk consumption by months for the period from August through December for the years 1927 to 1933 inclusive. This is represented by the dotted line in the three charts above.
This period was chosen because the State's campaign began in August 1934 and ran through December. The solid lines above represent the actual trend of consumption for the five months period in each year. The average curve or dotted line is projected in each case from the point of actual consumption in the month of August and shows what would have happened had the normal course of events followed through the succeeding four months.
It will be seen that in both 1932 and 1933 the actual figures as recorded were very close to the average curve thus applied, indicating that they followed the normal seasonal decline. The light shaded areas represent recorded gains over the average and the dark shaded areas represent recorded losses under the average. In 1934, however, it is shown that milk receipts in the Metropolitan area held consistently above the projected average curve. The State's advertising campaign was the only new factor in which this net gain can be credited.
