Boston lettuce lacks the crispriess of iceberg but is an excellent salad green and better suited for use in sandwiches and garnishing than iceberg. Arizona iceberg lettuce is in excellent condition but its price is much higher than in recent weeks.

Asparagus at Last Plentiful Unfavorable weather in California and favorable weather in California and favorable weather in South Carolina have resulted in both markets beginning to ship asparagus heavily in the same week and a real slump in its price. It should be within the reach of the average consumer by the end of the week. Other vegetables which are attractively priced are string beans, and carrots.
