TURKSTAN REUNION, by E. H. Lattimore, describes a part of the world which has always been viewed as romantic and mysterious and reminds us once again that the problems of every day life are not so easily solved in every country as they are in the well known cities of the Western world. It is a real story of adventure and there is not a dull page in the book.
THE GREAT WALL CRUMBLES, by Grover Clark, is a book with much serious and authoritative information, written in an entertaining style. Countless books have, of course, been written on China and the Far East, but this is one of the most comprehending besides being of very recent date.
BRIGHT MEXICO, by L. Baretti, is a friendly informal interpretation of one of our neighbor countries. It is not a guide book in the strict sense of the word, not a travel book, but a delightful intimate account of experiences in a picturesque and unusual setting.
PEACE WITH HONOUR, by A. A. Milne, is a protest against war written by an Englishman who is well known to all American readers, including the children, thru his previous writings.

Its brilliant, vivid, descriptive detail with many illustrations makes it illuminating, informative and highly interesting. Among the wills probated in Allegany County Surrogate Court at Belmont were that of the late D. M. Greene of Andover.
A house and lot in the \$200 estate of Delwin M. Green, Andover, was willed to Bert and Alena Payn, Perry, executrix and the residue directed divided equally between Mrs. Payn, Susie Langworthy of Alfred, and Edith H. Potter of Churchville.
The will of Miss Anna M. Hatch of Belmont left \$10,000 to trustees of Cornell University to establish the Anna M. Hatch Indian scholarship. The net income to be used for college expenses of some American Indian in attendance at the university. If no student applies "the income may be used for the best advantage of the university." Miss Hatch, recognized authority on the history and present status of the American Indian in New York State at the time of her death, was chairman of Indian welfare of the Western New York Federation of Women's Clubs and was in close touch with Indian leaders on New York reservations by whom she was held in high esteem. Other bequests to church, homes for aged and individuals were included in the will.
