At a mouting held at the Belmont High School, Monday, April 8th, the principals and coaches of Allegany county laid plans for a county baseball league for the spring season, with eight school participating.

The sectional play-off will be held May 31 and the Rochester finals June 8 and 15.

. A-H-S-KINDERGARTEN WORK TO BE STARTED

Beginning immediately after the Easter vacation, kindergarten in-struction will be provided by And-over High School for a two hour period each day for the remainder

This instruction is available to all children not in school who will have had their fifth birthday by May 1. Children under this age cannot be absepted since it is generally recognized that pupils be at least five and one half years old before starting the work of the first grade.
