COUNTY BASEBALL LEAGUE ORGANIZED

At a meeting held at the Belmont High School, Monday, April 8th, the principals and coaches of Allegany county laid plans for a county baseball league for the spring season, with eight schools participating.

The eight schools will be divided into two sections, each group having a home and home series followed by a play-off between the sectional winners. All schools will rate as "B" schools and the winner of the county championship will represent Allegany county in the "B" finals at Rochester.

The "Eastern" section consists of Angelica, Canaseraga, Belmont and Andover. The "Western" section is made up of Cuba, Friendship, Richburg and Fillmore. Bolivar will have a team, but it will have an independent game schedule since it is the only "A" school in the county having a team and will thus automatically play at Rochester in the "A" division.

The schedule for Andover is as follows: April 30, Canaseraga, here; May 3, Belmont, there; May 10, Angelica, there; May 14, Canaseraga, there; May 17, Belmont, here; May 24, Angelica, here.

The sectional play-off will be held May 31 and the Rochester finals June 8 and 15.

KINDERGARTEN WORK TO BE STARTED

Beginning immediately after the Easter vacation, kindergarten instruction will be provided by Andover High School for a two hour period each day for the remainder of the year.

This instruction is available to all children not in school who will have had their fifth birthday by May 1. Children under this age cannot be accepted since it is generally recognized that pupils be at least five and one-half years old before starting the work of the first grade.

Kindergarten pupils will report in the first grade room daily at 10 o'clock in the morning and will be dismissed at 12 o'clock. There will be no afternoon session. First grade pupils will report as usual. The first session will be held Monday April 29th. Parents are requested to accompany their children the first day, both to and from school.

The aim of this instruction is to acquaint the children with school routine, to make them more group conscious, to teach them certain manual skills, to develop an enjoyment for art and music and to encourage proper contacts with other pupils. All parents having children of the required age are urged to send them to this kindergarten period as a preparation for regular school next year.
